

I'm not sure why Toni decided to venture off to Fish Canyon but he did climbing up the hill behind the horse stables taking a few pictures. No one seemed to know much about Toni. He came to SWSA from the Pasadena club. During his time at PSS he mentored Tony Brooks in his first flying experiences. He was their equipment manager using his Volkswagen bus to haul equipment, much of which he designed and built himself and SWSA still uses today. For 34 years he worked for Cal Tech as a machinist. He was responsible for SWSA obtaining our current field and dealt with the Army Corps of Engineers.

Even when his health took a turn he left the site with a smile. He turned to the right glove to allow his hand to better hold the transmitter stick.


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I'm sure that the one phase many of us will recall is his use of his word "fella". His German accent had a way of making that one word a common catch all between us.



My Winter Projects

With all this wet weather I have been building the Aquila I bought from Harvey's action. I always wanted one when the kit was released. It's hard to imagine I was in high school when that kit was released. My allowanced could not support the purchase price so here we are so many years later building the kit Harvey never got to.





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I still have lots to do on the Aquila.

My other project is a power plane named the Timber. It is available from E-flite and is powered by a .10 electric motor equivalent. Using a 2200 mah 3 cell Lipo you can get 8 minutes of flying time. This model assembles in 1 hour and is really well put together. It has the option for floats if you want to use them. Being a short takeoff and landing design (STOL) it is well suited for small fields or parks. With the flaps in full deployment it slows down to walking speed.

I used all of the servos assigning them to each channel. The kit has the option to use the ailerons and flaps connected to a Yharness. I like the versatility of each surface being independent but the choice is yours.
